Description of Proposed Project:

Milnor Multi-use Path to Park/Pool- We would construct a multi-use path linking the 10 foot wide asphalt path along 4th Street (aka Main Street) and the sidewalks and concession stand in the Milnor Park. This path would be new development. The path would be used for walking, running, biking, wheelchair use and rollerblading (non-motorized) recreation. The path would begin at the existing 10 foot wide existing blacktop (asphalt) path at the intersection of 4th Street (aka Main Street) and proceed east along and parallel to 2nd Avenue. The path would be a 4 inch hot bituminous pavement thickness on a prepared base of gravel and clay. The path would run 700 feet east (.1326 mile) to meet up with the cement patio area at the Milnor Park concession stand. Along this path the sidewalk would T-off to meet up with an existing sidewalk leading to the pool. All disturbed grass would be backfilled with black dirt and replanted. At the present time there is no sidewalk or path in this area and children and adults must walk on the street, parking lot and/or on the grass to access the park from any direction. The only area for walking is a short sidewalk around the pool. This is not a safe situation for our citizens. The City and Park District would maintain the property and keep walkway in good repair. This project would be a single phase project to be completed in the construction year of 2015.

4. Name of Project: Milnor Multi-use Path to Park/Pool

5. Project: One Phase - New Project

We would construct a multi-use path linking the 10 foot wide asphalt path along 4th Street (aka Main Street) and the sidewalks and concession stand in the Milnor Park. This path would be new development. The path would be used for walking, running, biking, wheelchair use and rollerblading (non-motorized) recreation. The path would begin at the existing 10 foot wide existing blacktop (asphalt) path at the intersection of 4th Street (aka Main Street) and proceed east along and parallel to 2nd Avenue. The path would be a 4 inch hot bituminous pavement thickness on a prepared base of gravel and clay. The path would run 700 feet east (.1326 mile) to meet up with the cement patio area at the Milnor Park concession stand. Along this path the sidewalk would T-off to meet up with an existing sidewalk leading to the pool. All disturbed grass would be backfilled with black dirt and replanted. At the present time there is no sidewalk or path in this area and children and adults must walk on the street, parking lot and/or on the grass to access the park from any direction. The only area for walking is a short sidewalk around the pool. This is not a safe situation for our citizens.

The City and Park District would maintain the property and keep walkway in good repair. This project would be a single phase project to be completed in the construction year of 2015.

6. Description:

The project would be in the City of Milnor, Milnor Township, (Township 132N, Range 54N in Section 9) Sargent County, North Dakota, Block Two of the Johnson

Addition. The area to be covered by the path is owned by the Milnor City Park. The project would be a 10 foot wide, 700 foot path (1326 mile) in the 400 and 500 Block on 2nd Ave. The area to be used for the path is a grassed area with no structures to move or work around. The City of Milnor has reviewed the location of the multi-use path and is not aware of any issues with historical, environmental or ecological concerns. The area to be developed has no wetlands and the project will not encourage pollution or negative environmental problems or contamination. Our community will work with the state of North Dakota in reviewing any concerns or issues with a cultural review. The project is within the borders of the Milnor Park District (see attached map) and the surrounding area is owned by the Milnor Park District and the City of Milnor.

7. Legal Description:

The project would be in the City of Milnor, Milnor Township, (Township 132N, Range 54N in Section 9) Sargent County, North Dakota. Parcel # 25-772200, #25-7721-02 and # 25-7721000.

8. Latitude and Longitude

9. Population:

The population of Milnor is 653 people.

10. Recreational Opportunities:

The Milnor Park department built a new swimming pool in 2000 and a new picnic shelter was added to the renovated park. In 2010, the Park Board gave the pool a facelift. Our Park District offers swimming lessons each year and encourages an active T-ball, softball and baseball program. The park has recently added a new basketball court and skateboard area and the community has built a handicap accessible walking path along Main Street for safer usage.

The school track and football field are adjacent to the park and this area can be used by all individuals when not in use by the school.

Milnor also has Lakeview Golf Course which is located in the northwest corner of Milnor. This is a challenging 9 hole, 36 par course which winds around Storm Lake on a gently rolling course. The course sports a club house, golf cart rental and storage. In 2009, the community owned golf course completely remodeled and refurbished the club house.

In 2007, Milnor held its first 5K Run, encouraging physical fitness for adults and youth. This is now an annual event.

In 2003, Milnor built the MACC Community Center that many individuals use to play basketball and run/walk in poor weather conditions. This facility also has an exercise room with a variety of exercise equipment available to all.

Future plans in Milnor are to replace sidewalks that are in poor condition to encourage walking, running, biking and rollerblading.

11. Significance of Project

This project would encourage use of the Park with a safe accessible shared-use path used for walking, running, biking, cross-country skiing and rollerblading recreation that will be open to the public. Presently individuals are walking in the street, parking lot and/or the grass.

12. Survey:

The City Council and Milnor Park Board, as part of their responsibilities, have reviewed the need for sidewalk within our community and have observed many children walking on the street to get to the park and pool. We have also had many individuals come to the City requesting sidewalk access within our community and better access to our Park.

13. Recreational Improvement Plan:

Milnor's long term plan is to improve mobility to access the park, community center and school.

In 2006, the City of Milnor, Development Inc. and ND Park & Recreation worked together to build a 10 foot wide, handicap accessible walking/bike path along our Main Street which spanned three blocks. Previously there was no sidewalk or path to walk along Main Street which caused a very dangerous situation.

Our plans for our next steps are to build a path which would link Main Street to the Park with a multi-use path. This will enable our community to have safer access to our park system.

Milnor received a Safe Routes to School grant in 2009 for sidewalks, crosswalks, and handicap ramps around the Milnor School and MACC Community Center, along Main Street and going across the railroad tracks. In 2013 Milnor again received a Safe Routes to School grant for five blocks of sidewalk north of the railroad tracks along Main Street and one block of sidewalk near the school. These sidewalks included handicap ramps and crosswalks. The City has also installed sidewalks near the school to enhance what Safe Routes has started. Our plan is to continue to replace sidewalks in poor condition and put in new sidewalks so that we can encourage our community to access our community thru walking, running, rollerblading, etc.

14. SCORP:

This plan would fulfill the regional recreational demands for Region V for improving the health and fitness and encouraging public recreational opportunities.

15. Partnerships & Agreements:

The City of Milnor and the Milnor Park District Board would work closely with the Park Department for maintenance and the care of the path.

16. Benefits/Negative Impacts:

The benefit for this project would be for adults and children to be able to use a path rather than grassed areas or the City Street and parking lot when they are going to the pool and park. We do not believe there is a negative impact. The City of Milnor has reviewed the location of the multi-use path and is not aware of any issues with

historical, environmental or ecological concerns. The area to be developed has no wetlands and the project will not encourage pollution or negative environmental problems or contamination. Our community will work with the state of North Dakota in reviewing any concerns or issues with a cultural review. The project is within the borders of the Milnor Park District (see attached map) and the surrounding area is owned by the Milnor Park District and the City of Milnor.

17. Americans with Disability Act:

The proposed path would be 10 feet wide and we would meet up with sidewalks/asphalt paths that already have handicap accessible ramps in place. The sidewalk and pool in the park are already handicap accessible. Milnor has put in 18 handicap ramps in conjunction with Safe Routes to School in 2009, which has made our community much more accessible to those with disabilities.

18. Completing Project:

Milnor would complete the project in the building season of 2015 when seasonal building is permitted.

19. Costs:

A total cost estimate of \$ 88,800.00. Funding - \$17,760 City of Milnor and Milnor Park District contribution and \$71,040 contribution North Dakota Parks and Recreation - Recreation Trails Program

20. Funding:

Milnor has a 1 ½ % city sales tax which a portion of the funds can be used for infrastructure and capital improvements. Milnor has the funds available to match this grant (80/20) through this fund. The City of Milnor and the Park Board would also work together to do preliminary work for the path as work-in-kind.

21. Partial Funding:

Yes, I believe partial funding would have an adverse effect on the project. As is the case with all small towns, we have a very limited budget. We are requesting 80% of this project as a grant. Our community can financially afford and are prepared to pay the remaining 20% which is the Park and City's commitment.

22. Prior Grants:

Development Inc. and the City of Milnor requested and received funds from ND Park and Recreation in 2006 for a handicap accessible walking/biking path along our Main Street. This was a 10 foot wide path that spans three blocks or .2784 miles. (see attached map – this path is marked in green). We have had a lot of positive feedback after putting in this multi-use path and our community is thankful we have a safer area for our citizens.

23. Project Boundary:

The project is located on Milnor City Park property and will give access to the pool and park. This property will be maintained by the City of Milnor and the Milnor Park

Board in perpetuity. The project is bordered by property owned by the Milnor Park Board and the City of Milnor (as highlighted on the map).

24. Title to Property:





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



Let Me Tell You About Our Community –

The City of Milnor is located in southeast North Dakota along North Dakota Highway # 13 in a bustling community of agriculture and industry. Milnor is very progressive with a variety of businesses, three churches, an activity center, an excellent park and recreational system, golf course, swimming pool, library and school.

Our business district includes businesses that have been a part of the community for over 125 years as well as new and beginning businesses. In the past couple of years we've had several entrepreneurs remodel their facilities and the elevator expanded their grain storing capacity an additional 2.7 million bushels. First National Bank has remodeled and expanded and Dahlstrom Funeral Home has built a new facility. We have added seven new Main Street businesses: Mrs. Klean Car Wash, Green Law Firm, Whimsies, a boutique which features a variety of gifts and accessories, The Keg, an ice cream and snack business operated by the Satellite Club (a community based organization), Crossroads Electric, a heating/air-conditioning and electrical company, Sakry Plumbing, a plumbing contractor and Erickson Farm, a agricultural tiling company. We have also welcomed Sheyenne Valley Tree Service, Strickly Kustom Graphic Design and Stitch an Image. In 2010, Milnor annexed 24 additional acres into our city as an industrial park. Sheyenne Valley Veterinary Service has recently built their 5,000 square foot facility in this new subdivision and other businesses are inquiring about this newly developed area.

All homes and business in Milnor have direct fiber-optic connections for ultra-high-speed internets. Residents and businesses enjoy the safety, security and slower pace of a rural lifestyle but need not compromise on technology in business, health care or education.

Our City Council is very proactive; encouraging individuals, families and businesses to move to our community with incentive packages. We have established a Renaissance Zone and at present have six projects in process and 44 completed projects. The City has worked with our Community/Senior Citizen Center, which also houses our city office, to make improvements that include air-conditioning, new windows and roof, new tables and chairs, ceiling tiles and handicap accessibility. In 2013 a handicap accessible ramp and door have been added to this facility thru a grant from the Otto Bremer Foundation. We have also made renovations to the city shop with funding from the Energy Efficiency and Conservation Block Grant.

The City of Milnor has recently replaced several sidewalks, putting in crosswalks at nine intersections and installing handicap ramps at six intersections using a grant from the Department of Transportation - Safe Routes to School. This past summer another Safe Routes to School grant replaced an additional six blocks of sidewalks. These grants will ensure safer walking and biking for our children. The City has also added two LED stop signs on Main Street for safer walking and driving for all our citizens.

In 2008, the City purchased 200 small trees which were used by the City in public areas and given to citizens for personal use. The City of Milnor was awarded two grants through the North Dakota Forest Service and an additional total of 90 trees were planted in 2011 and in 2013. Milnor is, and has been a member of Tree City USA for many years and has received the Growth Award. Milnor was chosen by the North Dakota Forest Service to be one of 40 North Dakota communities to be included in a new street and park tree inventory program, Community Threat Assessment Protocol that was conducted in 2012.

Milnor, along with many other communities in the state, has suffered overland and creek flooding. In 2009, the City constructed an earthen dike along the north and west edge of the city

to protect our community from flood waters that had previously entered our residential areas. Additional culverts and landscaping were installed to alleviate potential problems for individuals close to Storm Lake. Although we may still be threatened by high water, our citizens feel safer.

The Milnor Municipal Airport has recently been renamed the Milnor Harris Lunneborg Field and although it may be considered small, we are proud that many private planes use the facility. The local flying club, Milnor Aviation Inc., uses the airport on a regular basis and each year holds a fly-in breakfast to raise funds for improvements. In the past three years they have added a new lighting system for safer nighttime and bad weather landings, fuel tanks, rural water and a courtesy car to be used by individuals flying into the airport. In 2011, a new hangar was built by the Milnor Airport Authority and was partially funded by a grant from the North Dakota Aeronautics Commission. In 2013 trees were planted on the north perimeter of the airport and a terminal will be built in 2014, funded in part by ND Aeronautics Commission.

The Milnor Fire Department is an all volunteer group and in the past couple of years has had over 20 new recruits. In 2010, the Fire Department purchased a new fire truck featuring a 1,000 gallon tank and 1,250 gallon per minute pump with a grant through the Federal Emergency Management Agency. In 2012 a larger 3,000 gallon tanker and new extrication equipment were purchased. The Milnor Ambulance Department is a combination of volunteers and one full time EMT, which provides basic life support services in the community and surrounding area. They pay for new equipment with local tax dollars and donations and have recently acquired an AED (automated external defibrillator). The Milnor Ambulance Department has received a new 2014 ambulance, which has made our ambulance and fire department a "state of the art" instrument for our community.

The Milnor Clinic has been a part of our community for over 26 years. A board, composed of citizens from our community, work with the St. Francis Healthcare Campus to bring this service to the community. The clinic offers laboratory and x-ray services, along with doctors and nurses, to serve medical needs and offer quality care close to home.

Satre Public Library is located in the Milnor Area Community Center, which is connected to the Milnor Public School allowing students and teachers to regularly visit. The library has a system that rotates recently published books thru the facility. Books for all ages are available along with magazines, DVDs, audio books, puzzles and CDs. Recently the Library purchased a new software program which has cataloged all the books. This allows the library to scan books when checked in and out using barcodes and automatically sends emails to patrons when their books are overdue. The library and the Friends of the Library hold two book fairs each year to encourage reading for the youth and adults in our community and an annual fundraiser breakfast. The library's future plans include setting up a website to allow patrons to review books by title, author and a short synopsis and purchasing laptop computers for public use.

Milnor Public School has 220 students attending Kindergarten thru 12th grade. In 2013 the Milnor Public School District developed a Long Term Strategic Plan and also a Five Year Technology Plan. The district has been progressive with technology. The Milnor School has a computer classroom with 22 computers, a computer lab with 22 computers, and a mobile computer cart with 20 I-Books. Teachers all have iPads and for the 2013-2014 school year there are two carts with iPads for check out and classroom use. Meraki Wireless access system was added in 2013. The library has 12 computers. Each elementary classroom also has 2-4 computers for student use. In addition to computers, Milnor School has 17 Interactive Smart Boards. In 2011 an Interactive Polycom classroom was constructed. In 2012 the Interactive Television Studio was totally remodeled to include 70" flat screens. These two classrooms

provide additional course offerings through a consortium, as well as connecting to any North Dakota public school, and include dual college credit course offerings through a distance learning format. The school has recently added energy efficient improvements, air-conditioning and new staff positions. The school playground has seen the addition of playground equipment, a picnic table and sand box. Gainor Football Field and the Glenn Dorr Memorial Track, which is adjacent to the park, have also had improvements. The track was recently resurfaced, a high jump pit was added in 2012 and a new public address system was installed. Our athletic department is very progressive. The Milnor Boys Basketball team took the 2013 State Class B Basketball championship. Go Bison! The district has numerous other extracurricular activities in which students participate, such as: Speech, Drama, FBLA, Art Club, Yearbook, Science Fair, Student Council and Academic Olympics.

Our Park District offers swimming lessons each year and encourages an active T-ball, softball and baseball program. The park has recently added a new basketball court and skateboard area, constructed new dugouts and backstop, and gave the pool which was built in 2000, a facelift. The community has also built a handicap accessible walking/bike path along our Main Street for safer and better access to the park and downtown areas.

Our Community/Senior Citizen Center is a hub of activity each day as our seniors congregate for dinner and other activities such as bingo and card games. Computers are available also for all ages to use at this center. Housebound individuals have meals delivered to their door by community volunteers

A community gardening group has turned a vacant Milnor lot into a community garden. The garden has raised beds for handicap accessibility and residents volunteer their time, talents, seeds and plants with extra produce being offered to the local food pantry.

Lakeview Golf Course is located in the northwest corner of Milnor. This challenging 9 hole, 36 par course winds its way around Storm Lake on a gently rolling course. The course sports a club house, golf cart rental and storage. In 2009, the community owned golf course, completely remodeled and refurbished the club house. The club house is used not only for golf related activities but is also rented for graduations, anniversaries and other get-togethers.

The Merchants Club is an organization that advances and helps the various businesses and promotes the local community. The Merchants sponsor the yearly celebrations: June Jamboree, Crazy Days, Christmas lighting and their latest project has been large beautiful baskets of flowers that hang along our Main Street.

In 2007, the Milnor Area Community Center (MACC) volunteer group held its first 5K Run, encouraging physical fitness for adults and youth. The 5K Run is an annual event to raise funds to pay for the 15,750 square foot, donation built, community building that was constructed in 2003. The original cost of the MACC activity center was \$767,700, and the fundraisers have been able to bring the balance of the loan down to under \$20,000. The group continues with projects in the community to pay off the mortgage. Recently this group has raised funds for two weight lifting machines that were added to the fitness center in the MACC and a cooperative agreement has been made with a trainer who works with individuals of all ages.

In 2008, the Satellite Club, a community organization, the VFW and American Legion built the Freedom Park on an abandoned lot on Main Street. The park includes a gazebo, a variety of trees and a monument recognizing the veterans from our community. A variety of community gatherings have been held here including Centennial events, homecoming/school events and "Wednesday Night at the Park" with music, fun and food.

Satellite Club, which is a community wide organization, sponsors the Dinner Theater each February where the Galaxie Award is given to the most outstanding person of the year, the Miss Milnor Pageant, a scholarship to a deserving student and a Halloween costume parade. This group also donates each year to the area churches, the park, the library, Post Prom and Rif.

The Bison Booster Club was created to encourage youth in sports and has since branched out to the community with fundraising for school and area wide improvements. The club also has a gaming operation which provides a considerable amount of funding which have been used for many projects that were sponsored by other groups needing assistance. Recent funds have been used for the MACC, the swimming pool, a digital sign on Main Street that is used to display school and community announcements and the purchase of tables and chairs for the MACC activity center.

Youth Opportunity Unlimited, Inc., a non-profit corporation has recently formed. This group has received a grant from the State of North Dakota to build a new childcare facility. Ground breaking for this facility will take place in the summer of 2014.

If you are looking for a sightseeing excursion, Milnor is nine miles south of the Sheyenne National Grasslands which has 70,000 acres of public land that can be used for hiking, horseback riding or just enjoying the great outdoors. We also have a variety of lakes in the area for swimming, boating, fishing and relaxing. Additional information and a brochure identifying these recreational areas are available at our city office.

Milnor supports a number of fundraisers and events to help others. Here are a few of those events our community is a part of:

- Relay for Life is held each summer in one of the communities in our county. Milnor has hosted this event at the Glenn Dorr Memorial Track on a rotational basis.
- Each year our community supports the Saddle Up for St. Jude Fundraiser, which is a breakfast, trail ride, supper and auction held to raise funds for the St. Jude Children's Research Hospital. Many individuals from the community take part by fundraising and enjoying a fun day held at a rural location.
- Cowboy Up Ride Against Cancer is locally held at a rural location with many individuals from the community supporting this event with their time and dollars..
- A formal dance and dinner is held in our community each winter as a fundraiser for the Multiple Sclerosis Society. This event is a good time for everyone to "dress-up" for a cause.
- Our community also supports Dollars for Scholars with fundraisers, an annual golf tournament and the Fine Arts and Academic Award Night ice cream social for scholarships. Each year scholarships are awarded and in the past ten years over one hundred individuals have received scholarships to further their education.

The City of Milnor has many other ideas for future projects, such as a walking path around Storm Lake, additional softball diamonds, a subdivision for more housing, a senior housing complex and continuing to encourage additional businesses to join us. 




