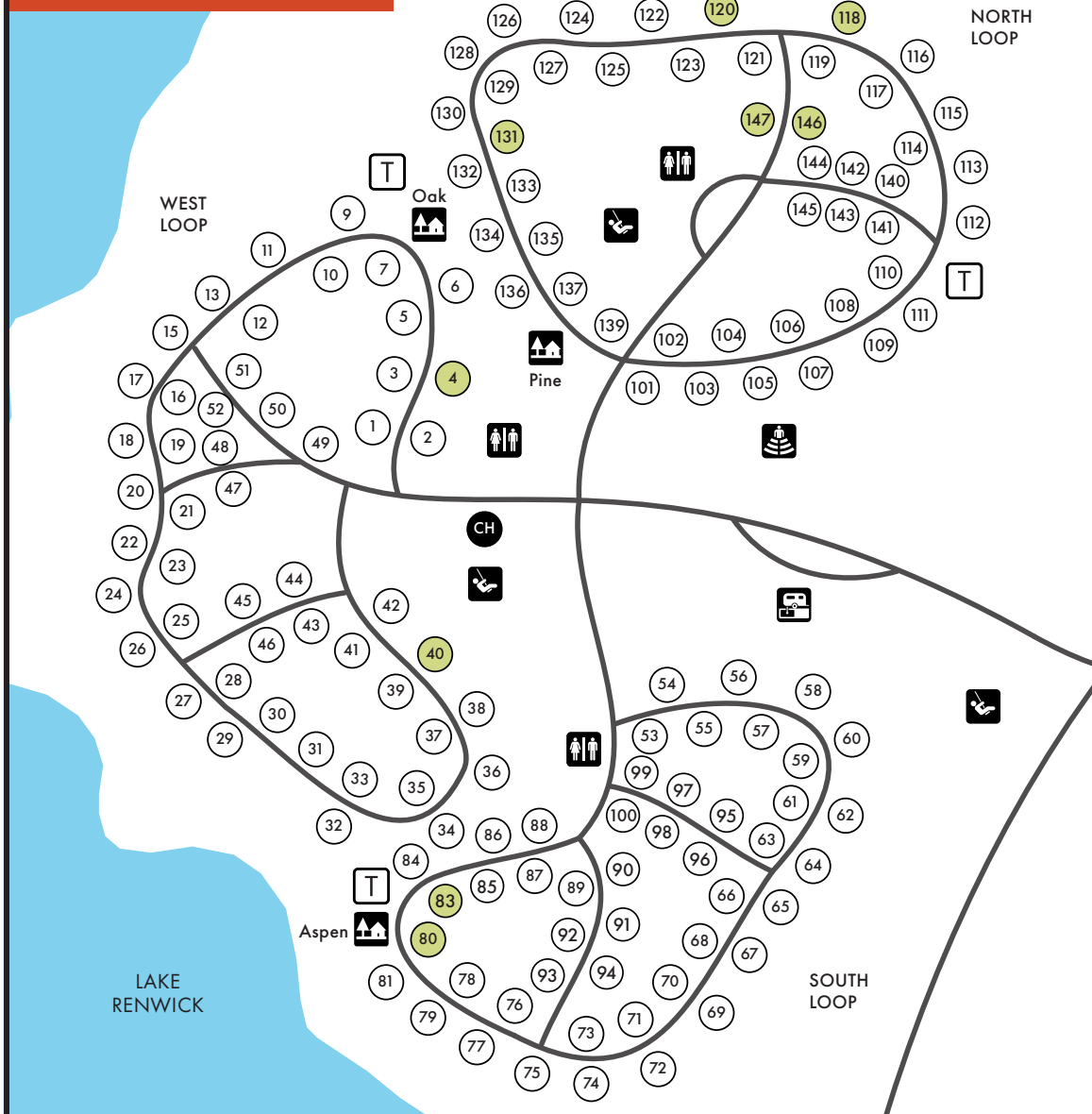

PARK HOURS

The park is open daily from 7 a.m. to 10 p.m. for use year-round.



CAMPGROUND QUIET HOURS

Quiet hours are between 10 p.m. – 7 a.m. year-round.



FIREWOOD

To help prevent the spread of invasive species, we ask that visitors do not bring or use out-of-state firewood. Collecting firewood in the park is prohibited. Firewood is for sale at the campground host site.



PETS ON LEASHES

Pets are welcome but must stay on a leash while in the state park. A dog park is located in the north-central portion of the park.

MUST SEE & DO

- Tour the Pioneer Heritage Center to learn about the 22 ethnic groups recognized for their contributions to the settlement of this area of North Dakota between 1870-1920.
- Hit the swim beach or rent a stand-up paddleboard, canoe or kayak and explore Lake Renwick. Rentals are available at the concession building located near the swim beach.
- Rent a bike through the bike share program and enjoy the 6.5 mile paved Cavlandic Trail that runs between the park and the city of Cavalier. Bikes are available near the Visitor Center or campground host site.

MORE TO EXPLORE

- Spend time exploring the three-mile trail system in North Dakota's first dedicated state nature preserve, Gunlogson Nature Preserve. The 200-acre natural wooded area along the Tongue River is a sanctuary for plants, birds, and wildlife. More than a dozen rare species exist in the preserve, ranging from watermeal to bishop's cap. The preserve also contains rare birds such as the pileated woodpecker and western wood-pewee.
- Grab a fishing rod and cast out from the fishing pier to catch fish, including bullheads, crappies, northern pike, perch, and walleyes.
- The park has several historical buildings from the area located on the property that are open to tour.

VISITOR TIPS

- Please follow speed limits. Keep an eye out for wild animals and respect their habitat by remaining a safe distance.
- Visitors are prohibited from collecting and removing any natural items or artifacts from the park.
- **Camping:** check-in is at 4 p.m., checkout is at 3 p.m.
- **Overnight rentals:** check-in is 4 p.m., check-out is at noon

VISITING IN WINTER

- The park has a variety of groomed trails available for use in the winter. Trails are groomed for cross-country skiing and packed for kicksleds and snowshoes. Kicksleds are available for rent at the park.
- Geocaching is a great year-round activity, download the free geocaching app, hit the trails, and find several geocaches located within the park.
- Ice skating, sledding, and ice fishing are also popular winter activities within the park.
