

PARK HOURS

The state parks are open daily from 7 a.m. to 10 p.m. for use year-round.



CAMPGROUND QUIET HOURS

Quiet hours are between 10 p.m. - 7 a.m. year-round. Generator usage is allowed from 8 a.m. - 8 p.m.



FIREWOOD

To help prevent the spread of invasive species, we ask that visitors do not bring or use out-of-state firewood. Collecting firewood in the park is prohibited. Firewood is available for purchase at sites 27 & 74 or the Visitor Center.



PETS ON LEASHES

Pets are welcome but must stay on a leash while in the state park. A dog park is located in the campground near the picnic shelter.



EMERGENCY INFO

In an emergency dial 911. Find fire danger ratings and restrictions at ndresponse.gov.

MUST SEE & DO

- Grab a trail guide from Trader's Bay Visitor Center and explore the Coteau Trail, a self-guided hike with interpretive stations. The nature trail features petrified wood and a boardwalk for an up close look at weland animals. Remember to leave natural items where you found them for others to enjoy.
- Rent a stand-up paddleboard, canoe, or kayak and explore Lake Sakakawea. Rentals are available at Trader's Bay Visitor Center, located
- Lewis & Clark State Park is located on Lake Sakakawea's western edge, the third-largest human-made lake in the United States. Grab a fishing rod and try your luck at the world-class fishing this lake is known for.

MORE TO EXPLORE

- Lewis & Clark State Park hosts events all year round, including Monster Mash, Family Fun Weekend & Flannel Fest. Come for the day or make it a weekend by camping or renting a cabin.
- Journey along the Eskers Trail and experience scenic views of the Badlands and Lake Sakakawea. These views are similar to what Lewis & Clark would have seen when they traveled through the area in 1805.
- The Visitor Center is open year round for your convenience. Ice, firewood, tackle, clothing, souvenirs, and snacks, as well as restrooms, are available.

VISITOR TIPS

- Please follow speed limits. Keep an eye out for wild animals and respect their habitat by remaining a safe distance.
- Visitors are prohibited from collecting and removing any natural items or artifacts from the park.
- Camping: check-in is at 4 p.m., checkout is at 3 p.m.
- Overnight rentals: check-in is 4 p.m., check-out is at noon

VISITING IN WINTER

- Grab your sled and head out to the park for an afternoon of fun on the sledding hill or rent a fat tire bike and explore the trails.
- Ice fishing is a popular winter activity. Anglers can find many species, including northern pike, sauger, walleye, and smallmouth bass.
- The park has over four miles of trails open for snowshoeing. Rent a pair from the park or bring your own and enjoy the beautiful trails.
