PETS ON LEASHES


Pets are welcome but must stay on a leash while in the state park and on all trails.

VISITOR TIPS

- Please follow speed limits. Keep an eye out for wild animals and respect their habitat by remaining a safe distance. Rattle snakes are common in this area. Check carefully before sitting down or climbing on rocks.
- Visitors are prohibited from collecting and removing any natural items or artifacts from the park or public trails.
- Camping: check-in is at 4 p.m., checkout is at 3 p.m.

• Hike or bring your horse to explore over 45 miles of trails in the heart of the Badlands, offering incredible views.

• While you are exploring the park, look for the wood lily, a rare plant that is located in this area. This is one of the few places in North Dakota where it

• Check out the overview platform for some fantastic views and photo opportunities. Grab your binoculars and look for wildlife, including bobcats, coyotes, horned toads, jackrabbits, mule deer and red foxes.

MORE TO EXPLORE

• The diverse landscape of the Badlands makes it a good place for birdwatching. The American redstarts, bald eagles, black-billed magpies, bobolinks, chipping sparrows, Cooper's hawks, golden eagles, mountain bluebirds, prairie falcons, sharp-tailed grouse, turkey vultures, and wild turkeys have all been spotted in this region.

• A unique plant species also found in this area is the prickly pear cacti. Keep an eye out for the beautiful yellow blooms.

TRAIL GUIDELINES

• The green trails on the map are open to the public May 1-October 31 but are not on state park owned land. Please respect property owners by staying on the trail. Riding and hiking off-trail is prohibited in these areas.

• It's important to practice leave no trace principles within the park and on public trails outside of the state park boundary. Pack out all trash, leftover
