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## VISITOR TIPS

- In an emergency dial 911. Find fire danger ratings and restrictions at [ndresponse.gov](http://ndresponse.gov).
- Please follow speed limits. Keep an eye out for wild animals and respect their habitat by remaining a safe distance away.
- Visitors are prohibited from collecting and removing any natural items or artifacts from the park.
- **Camping:** check-in is at 4 p.m., checkout is at 3 p.m.



### PARK HOURS

The park is open daily from 7 a.m. to 10 p.m. for use year-round.



### CAMPGROUND QUIET HOURS

Quiet hours are between 10 p.m. – 7 a.m. year-round.



### FIREWOOD

To help prevent the spread of invasive species, do not bring or use out-of-state firewood. Collecting firewood in the park is prohibited. Firewood can be purchased from the park office.

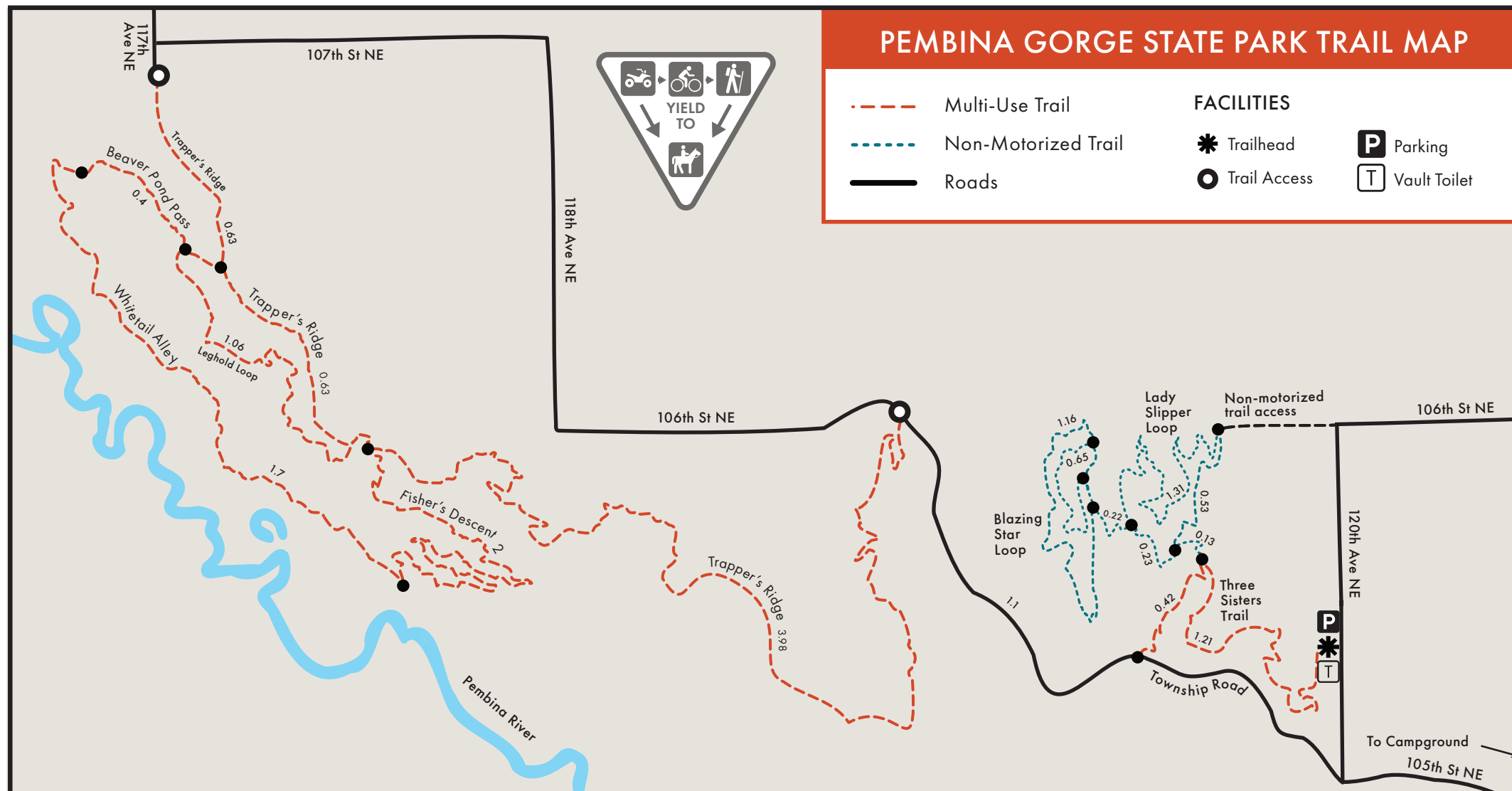


### PETS ON LEASHES

Pets are welcome but must stay on a leash while in the state park and on the trails.

## MUST SEE & DO

- Pembina Gorge State Park is home to an extensive trail system totaling over 16 miles. The trails are open to OHVs, hiking, biking, snowshoeing, and horseback riding. Please follow trail right-of-way signs, pack in and pack out, and watch for wildlife while on the trails.
- The state park is open to all three classes of OHVs, including motorcycles, dirt bikes, ATVs, UTVs, and side-by-sides. The trailhead offers parking that can accommodate large trailers.
- When water levels allow, visitors can kayak or canoe the Pembina River and take in the amazing views of the Pembina Gorge. Enjoy either a 3.5-mile or 10.75-mile paddle. Kayak rentals are available. Please reach out to our team for more information.
- Defined by steep valley cliffs, quiet prairies, and pocketed wetlands, Pembina Gorge is surrounded by the largest continuous, undisturbed forest in North Dakota. This rugged terrain is rich in wildlife, history, and paleontological resources.



## OHV REGISTRATION & RULES

### REGISTRATION

Registration is required to operate any OHV on public lands. North Dakota residents must register through the ND Dept. of Transportation.

Non-residents must purchase a non-resident public trails and lands access permit. Permits can be purchased at any North Dakota state park, by phone at 701-328-5357 or online at [reserveNDparks.com](http://reserveNDparks.com).

### TRAIL RULES

1. Individuals under age 12 may not operate OHVs on public lands.
2. OHV safety certification card required for operators ages 12-15.
3. Helmets required for operators and passengers age 17 and under.
4. Must have functioning spark arrestor and exhaust.
5. All OHV use is restricted to designated areas and trails.
6. Driver must obey all posted signs and traffic regulations.
7. Operator must be able to provide proof of liability insurance.
