

PARK HOURS

The state parks are open daily from 7 a.m. to 10 p.m. for use year-round.



CAMPGROUND QUIET HOURS

Quiet hours are between 10 p.m. – 7 a.m. year-round. Generator usage is allowed from 8 a.m. - 8 p.m.



FIREWOOD

To help prevent the spread of invasive species, we ask that visitors do not bring or use out-of-state firewood. Collecting firewood in the park is prohibited. Purchase firewood at the Visitor Center or at a campground host site.



PETS ON LEASHES

Pets are welcome but must stay on a leash while in the state park. A dog park is located at the southeast end of the park.



EMERGENCY INFO

In an emergency dial 911. Find fire danger ratings and restrictions at ndresponse.gov.

 Visit the Guardhouse Interpretive Center to step back in time and learn the story of the frontier military history of Fort Stevenson. The Guardhouse is open 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. daily, Memorial Day to Labor Day.

• Take a hike on the Flicker Loop Trail where you'll see native grass varieties,

small wooded ravine areas and a prairie dog town.

- Spend the day at the beach or rent a boat for a cruise on the water. Make sure to stick around to view the spectacular sunset over Lake Sakakawea.
- Cool off with North Dakota-made ice cream from the concession store down by the Garrison Bay Marina. Juneberry is the crowd favorite!

MORE TO EXPLORE -

- Fort Stevenson State Park hosts events all year round, including Maple Sugaring Day, Skyfest kite festival and Club de Skinautique water ski show. Come for the day or make it a weekend by camping or renting a cabin.
- The park's summer rentals include agua pads, fat-tire bikes, canoes, kayaks, fishing boats, pontoon, paddleboats, and stand-up paddleboards. Call ahead or rent some gear on the spot.
- Fort Stevenson is located on the northeastern part of Lake Sakakawea, the third-largest human-made lake in the United States. Grab a fishing rod and try your luck at the world-class fishing this lake is known for.

VISITOR TIPS

- Please follow speed limits. Keep an eye out for wild animals and respect their habitat by remaining a safe distance.
- Visitors are prohibited from collecting and removing any natural items or artifacts from the park.
- Camping: check-in is at 4 p.m., checkout is at 3 p.m.
- Overnight facility rentals: check-in 4 p.m., check-out noon

VISITING IN WINTER

- Fort Stevenson has a variety of groomed trails available for use in the winter. Fat-tire bikes, snowshoes, and nordic skis are available for rent in addition to kicksleds, a unique winter trail experience!
- Winter special events including luminary hikes, geocaching adventures and a fat tire bike race are just a few of the activities visitors can participate in.
- Bring your binoculars and look for bohemian waxwing, great horned owls, and red breasted nuthatch which are common to this area in the winter.
